Thematic background and goal of the seminar:

- In management, control is essential to ensure that an organization moves in the direction its leaders intend. Traditionally, control is understood in a cybernetic sense—measuring outcomes, comparing them to predefined targets, and taking corrective actions when deviations occur. However, this approach faces limitations when clear targets are absent, outcomes are not easily measurable, feedback is unavailable, or the necessary corrective actions are unclear. As a result, exercising control within (corporate) organizations remains both a practical challenge and a subject of ongoing research.
- Conducting has already been used as a metaphor in management studies, usually portraying the conductor as a leader in full control or as a charismatic and inspirational figure. While this metaphorical approach can be problematic, conducting constitutes an insightful exceptional case of management control. Despite the apparent differences between the domains of conducting and management control, both share the crucial challenge of coordinating the efforts of highly skilled individuals under difficult circumstances to achieve the best possible collective performance.
- We use interview data to investigate how conductors 'control' their ensembles. To this end, students prepare interview transcripts, analyze the interview data using qualitative content analysis methods, and discuss how far the insights can be transferred to the discipline of management control.
- The seminar gives students valuable experience of scientific work, preparing them for thesis writing.
- The seminar paper can be written in German or English.
